What is economic abuse?

Economic abuse involves behaviours (restriction, exploitation and sabotage) that interfere with a partner's ability to acquire, use and maintain economic resources. In the context of domestic violence, it commonly takes place alongside physical, sexual and psychological abuse.

About the service

This service can help build the capacity of London-based domestic abuse services to respond to the needs of survivors around their housing. This includes offering information and guidance in complex housing cases, with a particular focus on survivors who own their home.

The service provides:

- A helpline for professionals seeking to access expert advice on privately owned housing for their work supporting survivors, as well as other complex housing issues arising from economic abuse.
- Training and information for staff working in domestic abuse services to better understand and identify economic abuse and to support homeowners effectively.
- Resources for those working in the domestic abuse sector on how they
 can respond to the housing needs of economic abuse survivors,
 particularly those in privately owned housing.
